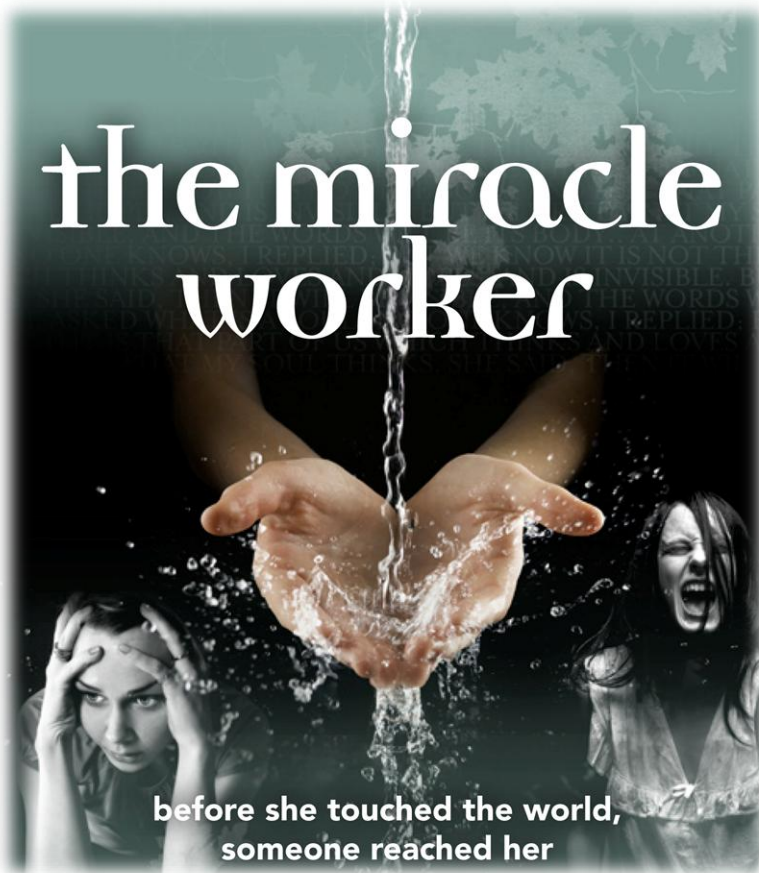

FOR DISCUSSION: WHO IS THE MIRACLE WORKER?

Type: post-viewing (recommended) or pre-viewing | **Suitability:** grade 9 and up

In the preface to William Gibson's 1983 play, "Monday After The Miracle," he writes: "...I have been asked a hundred times how I came to be so interested in her [Helen Keller]? I reply patiently I was never interested in her, the play is about her teacher, and for that reason is not named THE MIRACLE WORKEE."

1. What is your definition of the word "miracle"? Using that definition, in what sense was Annie just as much a miracle as Helen?
2. Early in the play, when Perkins director, Michael Anagnos, advises her that her battle at Tewksbury is dead and to "let it stay buried," Annie says, "I think God must owe me a resurrection." Then, after the live-in, garden schoolhouse experience, the Anagnos advice and her response re-visits her, and Annie completes the previous thought, saying, "And I owe God one." Looking at the 5th script segment, how does James' mealtime grace about Jacob wrestling with the angel and refusing to let go, "except thou bless me," help us understand the word "resurrection" and the action of "owing" from God to Annie and from Annie to God?
